Water Quality

Clear Lake sits at latitude and longitude .45.505 N -79.261 W but what makes Clear Lake different from other lakes in our area is our height. At an elevation of 351 meters above sea level, we have one of the highest lake elevations in the Almaguin Highlands.

From where we are situated we drain 2.6 square kilometers of land around the lake. Clear Lake forms part of the head waters of the Lake Huron Watershed by virtue of the fact that our lake water drains through the outlet at the end of the lake, through wetlands, creeks and lakes below us to find its way to the Magnetawan River, which then flows for 175 kilometers past the villages of Burks Falls and Britt as it empties into Lake Huron.

As part of a water shed, we understand that the activities that occur on our lake can affect the water systems elsewhere in the water shed. It a good thing to remember to avoid fertilizer usage anywhere near the shore line because of the likelihood of runoff adding to nutrient levels throughout the water shed.

Our members keep an eye on what's happening throughout the other lakes that are part of our system. We know that a number of lakes in the Lake Huron watershed have been infested with an aggressive invasive plant species called phragmites and one lake community just north of us had to post swimming advisories because of algae blooms in parts of their lake this summer.

CLPOA Association members are active in monitoring the health of our lake water quality to prevent these sorts of problems from occurring on Clear Lake.

This year we continued to enjoy good water quality on the lake. Although some of the testing programs such as the Lake Partner Program were down due to the COVID-19 emergency, we were able to make alternative means to continue our lake water testing program for nutrient levels by taking water clarity observations and phosphorus sampling on our own.

We continued our recreational water quality monitoring program this summer. Those results have been posted on the CLPOA website and indicate some very good results from the series of monthly tests taken at five locations around the lake.

The critical element in our lake water quality program is steps taken to prevent algae blooms occurring on the lake by monitoring lake water levels. We do this through work of association members working to

keep the beaver dam at the outlet flowing a steady pace in order to maintain lake water at levels that help remove the threat of seasonal higher than normal lake water surface temperatures.

This summer we were pleased to see we were sharing our lake with a number of new waterfowls, a Great Blue Heron, three Common Loons and two families of Mallards all were seen to be enjoying the lake with the rest of us.


